The GOOD NEWS is ... We will be recording our Zion Lutheran Sunday worship service for our every Sunday broadcast on KSOO 1000 AM at 10:00 am. We will also be making our Sunday worship service available on YouTube and through our various media outlets ... Facebook Page, Weekly Email List, Website. We will continue to do this weekly as long as we are asked not to gather together.

Also, the staff will be in the office regular hours through week. If you want to come in and have communion ... make an appointment with Maxine and I would be happy to give you private communion. If you want to come in and talk and/or pray ... make an appointment and I will be happy to talk and pray. We are available as your staff as usual only minus some of the visiting we are accustomed to do.

It's important that we honor those who have been put in authority that we would go with their recommendations. The Fourth Commandment tells us to respect government authority as it acts for the physical well-being of our great nation and the world. It makes me think of Romans 13:3-4, "For rulers hold no terror for those who do right, but for those who do wrong. Do you want to be free from fear of the one in authority? Then do what is right and you will be commended. For the one in authority is God's servant for your good."

If you know a need and are able take care of it for someone then do that. If you have a need or know of a need and can't take care of it, please call the church office, we have volunteers who are ready to help as best we can.

In the face of the COVID-19 threat, with all its fears and uncertainties, we can shine as people who have certain hope through our faith. Let our response reflect to other people around us that we live in faith, not fear, and that we are filled with hope.

Our hope is not in science, technology, or medicine. Our hope is in the One who has given us these good gifts and the greater gifts of life and salvation through the forgiveness of our sins. Through your faithful and hope-filled witness during this public health crisis, it's possible that people in your life will repent and receive the healing that only Jesus can provide.

Again, PLEASE follow the sound advice of medical professionals and public health officials to protect yourself and your loved ones from this virus. But do not fear. You are God's own child washed in the waters of Holy Baptism, cleansed by the blood of Jesus, and filled with hope.

There is a realm of deepest intimacy with Christ that God is calling us to be in.
